Audit Committee: Trustee Membership

From: Denise Joseph-Dowers, Senior Manager, Governance and Board Services

On September 10, 2010, O. Reg. 361/10, Audit Committees came into force requiring school boards to establish audit committees. The purpose and powers of the Audit Committee are contained in sections 9 and 10 of the Regulation.

Term

The Regulation allows the Board to determine the term office for the trustee members, but not to exceed four years (section 7. (1)). The Board shall also determine the term for non-Board members, but it may not exceed three years.

As per O. Reg. 361/10, two of the four elected Trustee members shall serve on the Audit Committee for a two-year term and the other two elected Trustee members shall serve on the Audit Committee for a four-year term.

On February 3, 2014, the Board approved a three-year term of office for non-Board members of the Audit Committee. Appointment of non-Board members will be considered by separate report.

Membership

The Regulation states that the composition of an audit committee "shall consist of seven members, including <u>four board members</u> and <u>three persons who are not board members</u>." (s. 33 (1) 3). If the Board does not appoint four trustee members, the Minister may appoint a person to each vacant position. The Audit Committee shall elect a chair from among its members (section 6 (1)).

Trustee members of the Audit Committee will receive an attendance amount of \$50.00 per meeting.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board appoint Robin Pilkey to serve as an external member on the Audit Committee for a period of three years, effective February 1, 2023.

Context

Ontario Regulation 361/10 was released on 10 September 2010 and outlined the requirement for school boards to establish Audit Committees. Under this Regulation, the Toronto District School Board (TDSB) Audit Committee consists of seven members, including four trustee members and three external members who have accounting and financial management background, and are not employed by school boards. The term of the appointment for external members is up to three years.

Currently there is one external member on the Audit Committee whose term expired on 30 January 2023. TDSB staff have worked on recruitment for the vacant position since November 2022. The volunteer opportunity was posted on the Board's website and on the LinkedIn site.

Applicants were shortlisted and interviewed by the Chair of the Board, the Associate Director, Modernization and Strategic Resource Alignment (as the Director's designate), the Executive Officer of Business Services and Comptroller of Finance and Enterprise

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Risk. Interviews were held on 20 January 2023, and the successful candidate was selected unanimously by the panel.

Action Plan and Associated Timeline

Once the appointment is approved, a letter will be sent to the candidate to confirm the 3-year appointment term from 1 February 2023 to 31 January 2026.

Whereas, the pandemic and inflation have deepened economic disparities and food insecurity, significantly increasing reliance on food banks and jeopardizing existing school food programs through significantly increased costs³; and

Whereas, the Federal government is consulting on a possible national school food policy but has not indicated when they might implement a program or when funding might be available, nor indicated how they might address broader issues of food insecurity⁴;

Therefore, be it resolved:

- (a) That the Chair write to the appropriate Ministries within the provincial and federal governments to highlight the immediate need for support for student nutrition and request increased funding, and reiterate calls for a fully-funded, national school food program and programs that address food insecurity;
- (b) That the letter in Part (a) be shared with Members of Parliament, Members of Provincial Parliament, and other relevant organizations, including the Ontario Public School Boards' Association and Ontario Student Trustees' Association.

What is CWELCC?

Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care System

- The Federal government committed to investing in a national child care system with all provinces and territories
- As part of the agreement the province of Ontario receives \$13.2 billion over six years beginning in 2021-2022
- The goal is to provide quality, accessible, affordable child care across the country
- Key goal is to reach an average of \$10/day as the average base fee for licensed child care by 2025-2026
- The TDSB is committed to providing quality, accessible, affordable child care across our system



CWELCC System Eligibility

To be eligible for the CWELCC system, a child care program must meet the following criteria:

- a) Must be a licensed child care provider
- a) Enter in to a Service Agreement for CWELCC with the Service System Manager (City of Toronto)

CWELCC funding is only provided for children **under** the age of six years old (or turning six before June 30).



Toronto District Extended Day Program (EDP)

- The TDSB established an Extended Day Program in 2018 to provide greater access to before- and after -school programs for kindergarten to grade 6 students in schools where no program was available
- The TDSB operates 22 EDP sites across the City of Toronto
- Approximate age of children in the program is 4-12 years old
- EDP is required by the Ministry to operate on a cost-recovery model
- EDP operates within the Ministry of Education requirements for schools and adheres to all TDSB policies and procedures
- EDP is not a licensed child care program and therefore does not qualify for the CWELCC system
- In order to be eligible to apply for CWELCC the TDSB would be required to convert EDP to a licensed child care program



Key EDP Data

- As of December 2022 there were a total of 702 students enrolled in the EDP program across 22 school locations
- Approximately 24% would qualify for CWELCC based on age and fees paid
- Approximately 76% do not qualify for CWELCC based on age and fees paid
- CWELCC funding only applies to students under 6 years of age. The EDP program has a limited number of children 4, 5 or 6 years of age that would qualify



Third-Party Child Care providers in the TDSB are currently better able to benefit from CWELCC funding based on two key factors:

- a) They all operate licensed child care programs (no operational changes or one time set up costs are required)
- a) They serve children from birth to 12 years of age and are able to apply CWELCC funding to a larger number of families



Licensing Costs

To convert EDP to a licensed child care program the TDSB would incur significant additional costs:

- One time implementation costs
- Additional staff may be required at some sites at additional cost
- Supervisory positions will be required at additional cost
- Current EDP inflation costs (7.5%) exceed the allowable increase amount under CWELCC (2.75%)
- EDP is currently operating at a loss and would add to TDSB budget pressures



Next Steps

 The TDSB continues to consult with City of Toronto and union partners on next steps

 The TDSB will have the opportunity to revisit the CWELCC funding decision in future years

Returning to In-Person Learning - Transitions

Virtual Learning Team:

- Facilitate the transfer of students

- (2) A meeting of a committee of a board, including a committee of the whole board, may be closed to the public when the subject-matter under consideration involves,
- (a) the security of the property of the board;
- (b) the disclosure of intimate, personal or financial information in respect of a member of the board or committee, an employee or prospective employee of the board or a pupil or his or her parent or guardian;
- (c) the acquisition or disposal of a school site;
- (d) decisions in respect of negotiations with employees of the board; or
- (e) litigation affecting the board. R.S.O. 1990, c. E.2, s. 207 (2).
- (2.1) Closing of meetings re certain investigations A meeting of a board or a committee of a board, including a committee of the whole board shall be closed to the public when the subject-matter under considerations involves an ongoing investigation under the Ombudsman Act respecting the board

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
