Whereas, the exact number of people affected by FASD is unknown, but it is estimated that two to three (four to five) percent of the population are born annually with the effects of prenatal alcohol exposure; and

Whereas, the estimated cost of FASD in Canada is \$4 billion per year covering education, health, mental health, social services and justice costs; and

Whereas, about half of all pregnancies are unplanned meaning developing fetuses are inadvertently exposed to alcohol; and

Whereas, people around the world began observing International FASD Awareness Day on September 9 each year beginning in 1999, in order that on the ninth day of the ninth month of the year, the world will remember that during the nine months of pregnancy it is important to abstain from alcohol; and

Whereas, the Government of Ontario officially recognizes September as FASD Awareness Month; and

Whereas, with Bill 44, *An Act to amend the Education Act in relation to Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD*), the Province of Ontario provided for board activities to promote awareness and understanding of Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder, including best practices to support pupils who may have FASD; and

Whereas, the Toronto Catholic District School Board decided that it would annually recognize September as FASD Awareness Month and September 9th as Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder Awareness Day (FASD); and

Whereas, the health and well-being of students are enhanced by the support of a broad effort to educate about and prevent FASD;

Letter in Support of a National School Food Program

To Whom It May Concern:

In its 2019 budget, the Canadian Liberal government announced its intention to work with provinces and territories to <u>develop a national school food program</u>. As the only G7 nation without a national school food program, the TDSB urges the federal government to follow through with the implementation of this pledge.

With 27% of children living in poverty as of 2017, Toronto is the child poverty capital of Canada (TDSB, <u>Enhancing Equity Task Force Report and Recommendations</u>, 2017). It is imperative that the inequities of food security that exist in this city be addressed; the development of a national school food program would be a step in the right direction.

As the consequences of climate change are becoming more widely known and understood, a national school food program would also provide an opportunity to deepen our educators' and students' understanding of environmental sustainability as it relates to a healthy diet and a sustainable food system. Students not only learn from explicit curriculum, but also learn through the "hidden" curriculum (the actual practices and school cultures in which they learn by example and through activity).

This letter was set in motion following a recommendation from the TDSB's Environmental Sustainability Community Advisory Committee (ESCAC). ESCAC was established in 2010 to help inform the TDSB's environmental policies and programming, and is a committee comprised of parents, community partners, Trustees and TDSB staff. The TDSB would support the implementation of a national school food program and encourages the Canadian federal government to develop a program that adheres to the guiding principles of the <u>Coalition for Healthy School Food</u> and considers environmental sustainability.

Grade 9 EQAO Mathematics Assessments for 2019-2020

Whereas, in the light of the current labour situation, the Minister of Education wrote to school boards on January 8, 2020 to suggest that school boards make local decisions about whether the EQAO Semester 1 Grade 9 math assessment scheduled for January 2020 be postponed to June 2020; and

Whereas, the Minister further directed that for those boards that determined not to administer the test in January, that students will need to take the test during the June 2020 administration period; and

Whereas, to ensure fairness, Grade 9 students in the second semester should be evaluated in the same manner as their peers from the first semester; and

Whereas, any cancellation of the Grade 9 EQAO mathematics assessment will have no direct or individual impact on a student's achievement and credit accumulation;

Therefore, be it resolved:

The Chair of the Board write to the Minister of Education to request that the Ministry:

- (i) cancel the Grade 9 EQAO Mathematics Assessment for the 2019-2020 school year;

French-as-a-Second-Language Program Review: Phase-out of Extended French Programs

A. That the following Board decision of June 19, 2019, concerning, in particular, the timelines for the streamlining of entry points for French-as-a-Second Language programs, be reconsidered:

That the following recommendations on the findings of the French-as-a-Second-Language program review, as presented in the report, be approved:

... (i) That Intensive French-as-a-Second-Language programs be restructured leading to a single intensive French Immersion program model with two entry points (Junior Kindergarten and Grade 4), and that all other entry points be eliminated in the report, be approved....

Whereas, the report to the Board of Trustees arising from the French Review and its associated recommendations, presented to the Committee of the Whole on June 12, 2019 and received by the Board on June 19, 2019, were extensive, require sweeping changes, and yet left virtually no time for the public to contemplate or comment; and

Whereas, the Board has traditionally afforded communities long off-ramps to adjust, plan, and make family decisions around program changes, boundary changes, and other significant decisions that may influence the choices made in relation to their children's educational futures; and

Whereas, staff's desired timeline for the phase-out of the Gr. 7 Entry Extended French and Gr. 6 Intensive Extended French at Cosburn Middle School was part of the report received by the Board but not explicit in the recommendations adopted by Board, and

Whereas, the timelines currently being implemented unfairly exclude students currently in Grades 4 and 5 in the served areas (as of the 2019-2020 academic year), by removing from them the option of accessing any intensive French program and in particular Intermediate (Gr. 7 entry) Extended French, which many expected would still be available for them; and

Whereas, the timelines currently being implemented unfairly exclude students currently in Grade 4 (as of the 2019-2020 academic year), by removing from them the option of accessing the Gr. 6 Intensive Extended French program at Cosburn MS, which many expected would still be available for them; and

Whereas, this cohort of students is too old to access the kindergarten or Grade 4 entry points; and

Whereas, there is still an opportunity to extend the phase-out of Gr. 7 Entry Extended French programs, as well as the Cosburn MS Intensive Extended Gr. 6 French program, so as to eliminate this Grade 4 and 5 "gap;" and

Whereas, based on the current schedule for the phase-out of Junior Extended French cohort that began in September 2019, Extended French programs will continue in secondary until the end of the 2027-28 school year, the same graduation year as the 2019-20 Grade 4s, meaning that overall Extended French programming will not continue past June 2028;

Therefore, be it resolved:

That students currently in Grades 4 and 5 in the served catchment areas as of the 2019-2020 academic year, be afforded the same opportunity to apply to an existing Gr. 6 or 7 entry Extended French program through to graduation, that their predecessors in this program have had, thereby ensuring all grades have the ability to apply to an optional intensive French program in the TDSB, and that all Extended French programming still come to an end in 2027-2028.
